Associated Meeting of the GSNA at the Annual Meeting of the American Society for Eighteenth-Century Studies (ASECS) in Toronto, 18-21 April, 1985:

The topic of the seminar of the GSNA -- suggested by the theme of the ASECS conference as a whole, "Anniversaries" -- will be ETERNAL RETURN: CYCLE, ECHO, REBIRTH IN GOETHE. The topic was deliberately broad and was designed to encourage a variety of approaches to the idea of recurrence in Goethe's works. The program will be announced in the next newsletter.

Goethe as No. 2 for European "Literary Parliament" in 1984:

In an election conducted by five European newspapers (<u>Lire</u>, <u>El Pais</u>, <u>La Stampa</u>, <u>The Times</u>, and <u>Die Zeit</u>), their readers elected Goethe as No. 2 into the "Literary Parliament" of the most important European writers. First place was taken by Shakespeare. Other German writers elected were Th. Mann and Kafka.

Goethe Yearbook, 2 (1984):

Volume II of the <u>Goethe Yearbook</u> is scheduled to appear in December 1984. For the first time, the yearbook will include a book review section, edited by Hans R. Vaget.
